An Extraordinary Jubilee Year of Mercy

On December 8, 2015, on the Feast of the Immaculate Conception, Pope Francis opened the Extraordinary Jubilee year of Mercy, inviting the entire Catholic and global community to reflect on the meaning of God's mercy and how to carry this message of mercy to our fellow human beings.

For Dismas Ministry, this is a special time to work even harder to carry out its mission—the work of mercy of visiting the imprisoned. In one sense our ministry will carry on as it has been, providing comfort and support to the members of Christ's body in prison. On the other hand, it is an invitation to intensify those efforts and to work more closely with fellow Catholics to bring the message of God's infinite, all-embracing mercy into the harsh and often hopeless life behind bars.

In the words of Pope Francis: "The call of Jesus pushes each of us never to stop at the surface of things, especially when we are dealing with a person. We are called to look beyond, to focus on the heart to see how much generosity everyone is capable. No one can be excluded from the mercy of God; everyone knows the way to access it and the Church is the house that welcomes all and refuses no one. Its doors remain wide open, so that those who are touched by grace can find the certainty of forgiveness. The greater the sin, so much the greater must be the love that the Church expresses toward those who convert."

The Liturgy of the Hours...Behind Bars

Dear Friend of Christ in prison,

When Dismas Ministry wrote the inmate study course **Pray Always** on the Catholic Tradition of Prayer we did it because it was clear from prisoners' letters that had no idea of the vast treasury of prayer in the Catholic Church. Nor did they realize that many Catholic forms of prayer actually had their roots in the ancient Jewish traditions. After all, Jesus, Mary and the first disciples were Jews who went regularly to the temple to attend the various feasts and other requirements: "...the parents brought in the child Jesus to do for him what the custom of the Law required" (Luke 2: 27).

Our Catholic Eucharist has its roots in the Passover meal shared by Jesus with his disciples at the last supper: "He said to them, "I have earnestly desired to eat this Passover with you before I suffer" (Luke 22: 15). Likewise, the Liturgy of the Hours, sung by countless monks and nuns, and now shared by lay persons the world over, originated in the temple worship where song and prayer were offered to God day and night: "Seven times a day I praise You" (Psalm 119: 164).

Before we published this study course on prayer, we didn't realize the effect it would have on some prisoners. Gradually, a number of them began to write to us asking if they could participate in the universal prayer of the church – *the Liturgy of the Hours*. We now have several inmates who are doing just that—using the 4-volume sets we have sent to them, to pray as the monks and nuns do daily in their round of prayer in their monasteries and convents. Now prison cells have become places of prayer too.

One of the out-growths of this special aspect of our ministry has been a partnership with a Catholic blog-site called *Canticles and Coffee*, the work of Daria Sockey, where she promotes the *Liturgy of the Hours*. When she heard our interview on Radio Maria, thow prisoners want to pray in this way too, she invited her followers to lend their support. They have been sending us the 4-volume sets and also donating the approximately \$140 it costs to purchase a set. Yes, it is expensive, but it would be even more costly for the world-wide Church if it did not have the prayers of its incarcerated members. How unfortunate it would be if prisoners did not have this opportunity to join their fellow Catholics—monks, nuns and lay people—in this hourly work of praise to God. For that is what the Greek root of *liturgy* means—*work*—the official work of the Church.

Dismas Ministry has been serving Catholics in prison for 15 years, since the Jubilee Year 2000. And now we are very excited about the Extraordinary Jubilee Year of Mercy declared by Pope Francis beginning December 8, 2015 and lasting until the Feast of Christ Universal King, November 20, 2016. This is the first year in our history, however, that a special project of our outreach has born such fruit.
