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Responsibility, Rehabilitation, and Restoration:

A Catholic Perspective on Crime and Criminal Justice A Statement of the Catholic Bishops of the United States, November 15, 2000

Every day Christians pray for justice and mercy in the prayer that Jesus taught us: "Thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven." Every day we recognize both that we are guilty of sin and that we are forgiven: "Forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass



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against us." This prayer, recognizes our failures and offenses, and acknowledges our dependence on God's love and mercy. Our Catholic faith can help us and others to go beyond the current debate and gain a deeper understanding of how to reject crime, help heal its victims, and pursue the common good. We wish to move away from the so-called "soft" or "tough" approaches to crime and punishment offered by those at opposite ends of the political spectrum.

In the United States, history tells us that the prison system was built on a moral vision of the human person and society—one that combined a spiritual rekindling with punishment and correction. But along the way, this vision has too often been lost. The evidence surrounds us: sexual and physical abuse among inmates and sometimes by corrections officers, gang violence, racial division, the absence of educational opportunities and treatment programs, the increasing use of isolation units, and society's willingness to sentence children to adult prisons—all contributing to a high rate of recidivism. Our society seems to prefer punishment to rehabilitation and retribution to restoration thereby indicating a failure to recognize prisoners as human beings. �

During Lent this past year, Pope Francis called for a special Year of Mercy.

He continued, "The call of Jesus pushes each of us never to stop at the surface of things, especially when we are dealing with a person. We are called to look beyond, to focus on the heart to see how much generosity everyone is capable. No one can be excluded from the mercy of God; everyone



knows the way to access it and the Church is the house that welcomes all and refuses no one. Its doors remain wide open, so that those who are touched by grace can find the certainty of forgiveness. The greater the sin, so much the greater must be the love that the Church expresses toward those who convert.

Dear brothers and sisters, I have often thought about how the Church might make clear its mission of being a witness to mercy. It is journey that begins with a spiritual conversion. For this reason, I have decided to call an extraordinary Jubilee that is to have the mercy of God at its center. It shall be a Holy Year of Mercy. We want to live this Year in the light of the Lord's words: "Be merciful, just as your Father is merciful (Luke 6:36)"

This Holy Year will begin on the coming Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception (December 8, 2015) and will end on November 20, 2016, the Sunday dedicated to Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe – and the living face of the Father's mercy. �


Hearing from Christ's Body behind bars... From Chaplains and Ministries

Dear Prayer Partners,

I want you to know how often I think of you and the prayers you offer on behalf of the prisoners we serve daily, and for one another. Our Union of Prayer is a rather unique group because many of you are family members with a loved one in prison, and others are directly involved in prison ministry.

So much has happened since our last newsletter, especially regarding the trips Pope Francis has made to South America and to the United States. Everywhere he went he made it a point to visit prisoners, embrace them and assure them of their worth in the eyes of God and the Catholic Church. He is living this special work of mercy, not just talking about it.

And here at Dismas Ministry, as is the case with many other Catholic groups and ministries, we are very excited about the Pope's announcement of the Extraordinary Jubilee Year of Mercy. It's a perfect fit with our mission of reaching into every jail and prison of our country and bringing the hope and mercy of God. It was fifteen years ago that we founded Dismas Ministry during the Jubilee Year of 2000.

By God's grace and with the intercession of our Mother Mary, our ministry has grown from a pilot project in Wisconsin to a national outreach to inmates and chaplains in every state. Our budget is not large, between \$250,000-\$280,000 each year, but it is like the temple oil in the Old Testament story that does not run out. In addition, prayer has been the underpinning of this ministry, because all

of you who are praying for it, are bringing God's grace to bear in the lives of hundreds upon hundreds of inmates who are rediscovering their Catholic faith and opening their hearts to God's action and healing. We receive so many testimonies daily and weekly, some of which are on the next page in this newsletter. These are just a small percentage of the testimonies we have received and treasure.

God's grace is powerfully at work behind bars. Many inmates are like Jonah the prophet, and find themselves swallowed up and trapped at the bottom of the sea of life, and unable to escape their situation without God's help.

At some point, when their lives seem to have hit bottom, they begin to rebuild with humble hearts. They receive a Bible and prayer book from our ministry, and then are invited to enroll in a correspondence course on the Catholic Bible, Catholic faith and/or prayer, and they begin their journey back to the Father's arms. For Dismas Ministry, it is an honor and a privilege to accompany them.

As Pope Francis reminds prisoners, "I am a sinner too" and as St. Paul wrote, "All have fallen short of the glory of God" (Romans 3: 23). We too, who carry out this ministry, along with those serve, are also sinners in need of God's grace and forgiveness. So as followers of Jesus and his vicar, Pope Francis, let's look to this upcoming Year of Mercy as a time of great grace. The mercy of God is boundless, it is there for
